## Management Discussion of Performance

### Results of Operations

The NEI Balanced Yield Portfolio's Series A units returned -0.7% for the six months ended March 31, 2022 compared with a return of -0.7% for the benchmark explained below.

Unlike the benchmark return, the Portfolio's returns are after the deduction of fees and expenses paid by the Portfolio. Performance differences between series of units are mainly attributable to management fees charged to each series. Refer to the Past Performance section for the details of returns by series.

The blended benchmark is composed of 50% Bloomberg Barclays Global Aggregate Index (C\$ hedged), 35% MSCI World NR Index (C\$) and 15% S&P/TSX Composite TR Index.

The Portfolio's net asset value decreased by 9.69% during the period, from \$144,509,486 as at September 30, 2021 to \$130,510,602 as at March 31, 2022. This change in net assets is attributed to net unitholder activity of -\$13,409,613 and -\$589,271 to investment operations, including market appreciation (depreciation), income and expenses.

### Factors That Have Affected Performance

For the six-month period ending March 31, 2022, markets were rocked by volatility ending the period just a notch higher. Despite the Omicron variant and elevated inflation, equities initially rose into the end of the 2021 on the backdrop of strong corporate earnings. The sentiment quickly turned in the new year as headline inflation continued rise to multi-decade highs and developed economy central banks expressed interest in taking on a more aggressive stance in response. Developed economy central banks accelerated their pace of monetary tightening, looking to end quantitative easing earlier than previously anticipated with some kicking off their rate hike cycle. Investor sentiment took another hit as Russia initiated its invasion of Ukraine, further increasing inflation pressures as the region is a large exporter of agriculture and energy. Central banks are caught in a dilemma as economic projections forecast lower growth and higher inflation. Global equities managed to post positive returns as earnings forecasts continued to steadily climb even as inflation and bond yields surged. The MSCI World (C\$) returned 0.78% while the Bloomberg Barclays Global Aggregate (C\$ Hedged) returned -4.92% during the period.

The Bank of Canada wrapped up its quantitative easing asset purchase program, moving it to a reinvestment phase where it would no longer expand its bond holdings, and raised rates for the first time in March since the onset of COVID by 25 basis points to 0.50%. Coronavirus restrictions from the Omicron variant were eased at the end of January. The unemployment rate fell to 5.5% already lower than the 5.7% reading pre-pandemic February 2020 and combined with elevated inflation gave the Bank of Canada confidence to hike rates, hinting that more would come in order to tame inflation. Canadian equities were among the strongest performers for the period as commodity prices surged on shortages due to the rapidly reopening global economies and the Russia-Ukraine war breaking out. The S&P/TSX Composite returned 10.54% and the FTSE Canada Universe Bond returned -5.60%.

In the U.S., the Federal Reserve became increasingly anxious as inflation surged to multi-decade highs. The Fed meeting minutes revealed growing concerns amongst members, to which the Fed announced it was accelerating the rate of the tapering of its asset purchase program. The focus has clearly shifted to the stable price component of the Fed's dual mandate as inflation pressures mount as Fed Chairman Jerome Powell said that U.S. labour market conditions were consistent with maximum employment. The Fed "dot plot" projections saw median projections rise to seven hikes for the year of 2022 and treasury yields soared. The S&P 500 (C\$) returned 4.43% over the period and the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Aggregate (C\$ Hedged) returned -5.93%.

In Europe, the Bank of England took markets by surprise becoming the world's first major central bank to raise interest rates since the pandemic, quickly followed up by a second and third hike. The European Central Bank confirmed an early end to their pandemic emergency purchase programme, signaling strong concerns about the elevated inflation numbers, even more so than slowing economy growth, and indicated that a rate hike would be on the table later this year. An unreliable supply of gas, falling investments in thermal energy, and maintenance work on nuclear power plants led to a sharp rise in energy prices across the continent, adding to the inflation even prior to the Russia-Ukraine war. The Russia-Ukraine war amplified these shortcomings as the region is heavily reliant on Russian energy. Japanese equities lagged as the country struggled to contain the virus and new waves repeatedly delayed Japan's reopening. The rising geopolitical tension also looks to have taken a toll, as global sentiment took a hit on exports. The MSCI Europe (C\$) returned -3.50% over the period while the MSCI Japan (C\$) returned -11.57%.

Emerging market economies continue to experience a weaker recovery than advanced economies, in the face of slower vaccination progress, less policy support, and more pronounced scarring effects from the pandemic. The Chinese economy continues to feel the burden from the real estate crisis and regulatory crackdowns. The China's National People's Congress held its annual session in early March, setting a target growth rate of 5.5% and listing its main objectives as setting the economy on course for a steady expansion in 2022, prioritizing job creation, and increasing social welfare. However, this growth target looks to be at risk as the country faces a renewed COVID wave. The government's zero COVID tolerance policy has resulted in widespread lockdowns in cities including Shanghai and Shenzhen, as well as the entire Province of Jilin. To add to the matter, the escalation of the Russia-Ukraine conflict and the rising prices of commodities is also hitting investor sentiment. Russian financial securities fell sharply as Western nations imposed sanctions on its key economic drivers, including oil pipelines and the SWIFT payment system. The MSCI Emerging Markets (C\$) returned -9.48%.

Overall, on a gross-of-fee relative return basis manager selection added value while asset allocation was flat.

In terms of asset allocation, the portfolio's overweight to equities and underweight to fixed income added value. Within equities, the allocation to US value stocks added value. Within fixed income, the allocation to high yield bonds added value while the allocation to Canadian bonds detracted value.

In terms of manager selection, outperformance of the NEI Global Total Return Bond Fund added value. On the other hand, underperformance of the NEI International Equity RS Fund and NEI Emerging Markets Fund detracted value.

## Recent Developments

Inflationary pressures have remained stubbornly persistent, moving consumer price indices to multi-decade highs in many regions around the world. Inflation was previously expected to peak in the second quarter of the year, but that may no longer be the case anymore as commodity prices surged as the Ukraine-Russia conflict escalated as Russia initiated an invasion and supply chain disruptions further intensify as China faces widescale lockdowns in face of a renewed wave. Growth projections on the other hand are waning in face of these headwinds. Nonetheless, central banks have pinpointed elevated inflation as the more pressing matter and investors are bracing for higher interest rates. The odds of a recession have no doubt risen, but a recession itself looks unlikely at this time. The underlying economy looks strong with the labour market continuing to post robust gains and corporate earnings continuing to hold strong. That stated, uncertainty is definitely elevated, and as we are still early in the rate hike cycle we expect more volatility to come in the months ahead.

In Canada, the month of March saw indoor capacity limitations lifted and vaccine requirements are now at the discretion of each business and not federally mandated. Travel requirements are also becoming more open. These measures being lifted will lead to increases in jobs and with that likely spending as well, both of which could further drive inflation higher. However, Omicron has shown that route to reopening is not simple and that going forward the path is likely going to have some setbacks. Canadian employment indicators will be key to watch in coming months, and will likely dictate central banks' appetites for interest rate hikes. Continued strong readings could reinforce the notion of 50 basis points hikes to come at future meetings. As of the end of March, markets are pricing as many as eight more hikes to come (25 bps each), which already means that there are multiple 50 bps hikes priced in, but watch for strong job numbers to confirm these expectations.

The U.S. Federal Reserve's latest Summary of Economic Projections saw 2022 growth expectations revised down to 2.8% from 4.0%, while inflation expectations gauged by personal consumption expenditures rose to 4.3% from 2.6%. Despite the slowing growth, the Fed dot plot, which reflects Fed officials' outlook for the Fed Funds Rate, saw the median projection rise to seven hikes for 2022, compared to just three hikes previously forecasted in December. This mounting inflation has the Fed seeing the need for rates to increase above the neutral rate over the next two years in order to counter these elevated levels of inflation, as the Fed looks towards a soft landing for the economy as it looks to tame inflation.

The reality is the economic risks are much greater for Europe than in the U.S. The reliance on Russian energy is one factor, but the E.U.'s economy is also much more dependent on trade, which could be negatively affected by continuing geopolitical problems that could reduce trade as firms look to decrease their foreign exposures to reduce risk. As such, the challenges for Europe are greater than North America, where the corporate landscape looks more favourable. Currently, the economic contagion into other countries from the Russia-Ukraine conflict has been limited. However, these geopolitical risks could see macroeconomic risks expand to other regions. Inflation risks running hotter as Russia and Ukraine are large commodity exporters, and supply disruptions could also further contribute with these new sanctions in place.

Higher commodity prices pose a significant risk to manufacturing hubs that are often concentrated in the emerging market space, such as China. To make matters worse, China is already facing a slowdown due from housing and regulatory tightening. The Chinese government has announced a target growth rate of 5.5%, but markets view it as a stretch goal, unless the country is to unleash more policy support. Global liquidity conditions are also a concern. Although the sanctions are specifically Russia-focused, investors around the world could look to de-risk as their investment appetite wanes, especially as rising geopolitical tensions start seeping into growth, inflation, and interest rate concerns.

## Related Party Transactions

Northwest & Ethical Investments L.P. ("NEI LP") is the Manager, Trustee, Portfolio Manager and Registrar of the Portfolio. Northwest & Ethical Investments Inc., the general partner of NEI LP, is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Aviso Wealth Inc. ("Aviso"). Aviso is also the sole limited partner of NEI LP. Aviso is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Aviso Wealth LP, which in turn is owned 50% by Desjardins Financial Holding Inc. and 50% by a limited partnership owned by the five Provincial Credit Union Centrals and The CUMIS Group Limited. Desjardins Financial Holding Inc. is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Fédération des caisses Desjardins du Québec ("Fédération").

NEI LP charges the Portfolio a fixed administration fee in place of certain variable expenses. NEI LP in turn, pays all operating expenses of the Portfolio, other than specified portfolio costs (e.g. the fees and expense of the Independent Review Committee ("IRC"), taxes, and brokerage commissions) which include payments to related parties. These services are in the normal course of operations and are measured at an exchange amount that is consistent with other independent parties. Desjardins Trust Inc. ("Desjardins Trust") is the custodian of the Portfolio. Desjardins Trust is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Fédération. The Portfolio may engage in securities lending and repurchase transactions, and Desjardins Trust may act as the Portfolio's securities lending and repurchase transactions agent ("Agent"). Any revenue earned on such transactions is split 60%—40% between the Portfolio and the Agent. Desjardins Securities Inc. ("DSI") is a broker responsible for security transactions on behalf of the Portfolio. DSI is wholly-owned subsidiary of the Fédération.

Where applicable the amounts paid in commission by the Portfolio to DSI and amounts received from underlying funds managed by NEI LP during the period are presented.

The Portfolio's sub-advisors may place a portion of their portfolio transactions with brokerage firms which are affiliates of NEI LP, provided that the affiliate's trade execution abilities and costs are comparable to those of non-affiliated qualified brokerage firms.

The Portfolio is distributed through Credential Asset Management Inc., Credential Qtrade Securities Inc., and members of the Desjardins group and other nonrelated parties by way of shared ownership. NEI LP pays to these parties distribution and servicing fees based on a percentage of the daily values of the units of each held by the dealer's clients and additionally, in some cases, on the amount of initial purchase.

NEI LP has established the IRC for the Portfolio in accordance with the requirements of National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds in order to review conflicts of interest as they relate to investment fund management. The Portfolio did not rely on an approval, positive recommendation or standing instruction from the Portfolio's IRC with respect to any related party transactions.

## Management Fees

The Manager is responsible for the management, supervision and administration of the Portfolio. The Manager receives from the Portfolio management fees, before HST, calculated daily on the net asset value of the Portfolio at an annual rate shown below. The Portfolio does not pay management fees for Series I and O units. Series I and O unitholders pay a negotiated fee directly to NEI Investments.

The management fee covers the cost of investment advisory fees, sales, marketing, and distribution expenses of the Portfolio. In addition, the Manager may pay a trailer fee to dealers out of this management fee. The trailer fee is a percentage of the average daily value of the units of the Portfolio held by the dealer’s clients. No trailer fees are paid in respect of any Series F and PF units of the Portfolio.

In addition to the fees and expenses directly payable by the Portfolio, certain fees and expenses may be payable by some underlying third party funds. The Portfolio indirectly bears its proportionate share of such fees and expenses. However, the Portfolio does not pay any management fees or similar expenses that, in the view of the Manager, a reasonable person would consider duplicate a fee payable by an underlying fund for the same service.

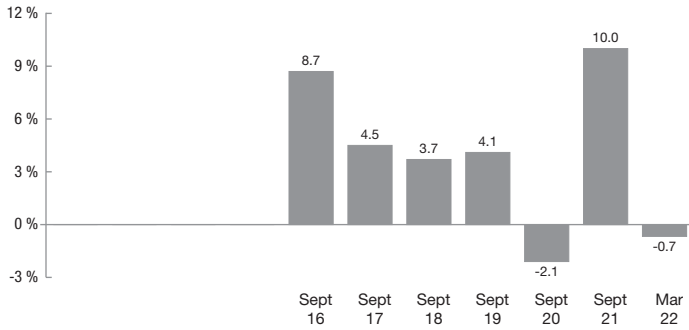
## Past Performance

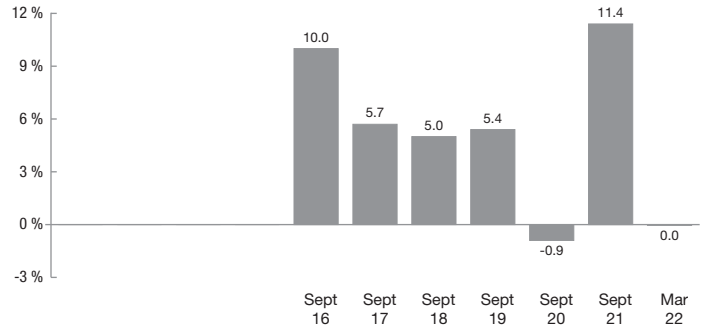
### Year-by-Year Returns
